


Who Came?

How people heard about the Workshop

- Personal Email or Facebook (20%)
- Word-of-mouth (15%)



What we heard: Land Use

- Protect and increase open space, parks, pocket parks
- Support for higher-density, walkable development in targeted areas
- Preserve and enhance unique character of neighborhoods



What we heard: Circulation

- Increase local and regional transit and active transportation connections
- More pedestrian amenities
- Improve and increase bike infrastructure
- Support for both traffic calming and improved traffic flow



What we heard: Housing

MOST PRESSING HOUSING ISSUES:

- Need for different or more types of housing options (27 votes)
- Homelessness (23 votes)
- Sustainable Developments (21 votes)
- Services for Special Needs (11 votes)
- Fair and Equal Housing Opportunities (11 votes)
- Preservation of Community Character (11 votes)

SUPPORT FOR:

- Retain and expand affordable housing opportunities
- Limit mobile home park conversions
- More mixed-use structures (housing with other uses)
- Solutions for people experiencing homelessness
- More multi-family housing
- Mixed feedback to increasing height and density of housing (some supported, others opposed)
- Mitigate impacts of vacation rentals
- · Replace golf courses with housing
- Moratorium on walled or gated developments

872 Comments Submitted


83% of Participants Full- or Part-time Residents

127 Map comments Submitted


82% of Participants Full- or Part-time Residents

Circulation


- Improve pedestrian amenities

 Nature Preserves more important than passive open space, active open space or trails with signage



Description of Terms

VISION

The vision statement serves as the foundation for all of the goals and policies contained within the document. The vision serves as the "common ground" from which all decisions are made.

PRIORITY

Values and themes that require more focused attention and future direction above and beyond that mandated by the state. Focused issues become features of the Plan and can be used to prioritize use of staff resources and allocation of budget.

GOAL

A statement of desired future conditions regarding a particular topic; a goal paints a picture of how something will be in the future. A goal itself is kept simple, with policies, objectives, and implementation actions providing further definition.

POLICY

A statement that guides decision-making and specifies public commitment. A policy defines and directs how to achieve goals.




What we heard: Vision

• 52% ok with current Vision

Recommended Additions

- Replace "high style"
- Cultural, architectural and historic resources
- Inclusiveness and diversity
- Natural environment and parks, sustainability
- Balance "resort community" with local residents of all ages
- Prioritize "village feel"
- Develop affordable housing rather than visitorserving uses
- Reference working population, educational opportunities and embrace of new technologies
- Mental and physical health and well-being







What we heard: Priorities

- Majority approve of Priorities as currently written
- Seven priorities exceeded 70% favorability as written
- Nearly 80% approve of efficient use of resources (Priority 2) and preservation of unique built environment (Priority 8) as written
- Lowest approval for range of retail
 (Priority 4) and range of housing (Priority 5) as written



Priorities to Discuss

Based on survey responses from Steering Committee members, the list below identifies the Priorities the group would most like to discuss during the meeting (in order of importance):

Votes to Discuss each Priority:

- 7 Priority 1
- 6 Priority 3, Priority 4, Priority 5
- 5 Priority 2, Priority 7, Priority 9
- 4 Priority 10
- 3 Priority 8
- 2 Priority 6





Priority 1: Support Palm Springs as one of the world's premier desert resorts.

- 76% of respondents voted to keep as is
- Suggested Changes:
 - Less focus on being "premier" or a "world" destination
 - Recognize City's identity as a small city with a local population
 - More economic diversity away from service and tourism
 - Remove reference to the "desert"
 - Remove "resort" ("destination", "community" suggested instead)
 - Addition of "place to retire"





Priority 2: Establish the City as a leader in efficient use of resources: land, water, and energy.

- 79% of respondents voted to keep as is
- Suggested Changes:
 - Add natural resource preservation
 - Add climate change
 - Include more specific goals





Priority 3: Diversify the City's economic foundations and promote Palm Springs as the 'first choice' for businesses

- 66% of respondents voted to keep as is
- Suggested Changes:
 - More economic diversity and business variety
 - Confusion about "promote" and "first choice"
 - Define specific types of businesses
 - Focus more on nurturing local businesses





Priority 4: Develop a full range of retail opportunities for local, regional, and tourist markets.

- 65% of respondents voted to keep as is
- Suggested Changes:
 - Unique destinations and businesses that cannot be found elsewhere
 - Add businesses that are not related to tourism or hospitality
 - Discourage chain businesses
 - Encourage experiential retail
 - Remove reference to tourists
 - Concern about retail in the age of internet shopping





Priority 5: Provide for a broad range of housing opportunities.

- 59% of respondents voted to keep as is
- Suggested Changes:
 - Discourage vacation rentals
 - Encourage more multi-family housing
 - Encourage more affordable housing
 - Support housing and services for people experiencing homelessness
 - Clarify "broad range"



Priority 6: Create unique places that strengthen community identity, offer visual interest, and support lively activity.

- 78% of respondents voted to keep as is
- Suggested Changes:
 - Reference accessibility
 - Define "unique"
 - Create spaces more focused on locals
 - Support underserved communities



Priority 7: Encourage the creative mixing of land uses to promote vibrant neighborhoods and reduce the need for vehicle use.

- 73% of respondents voted to keep as is
- Suggested Changes:
 - Improve infrastructure and safety for: biking, walking, bus system, golf carts
 - Is reduced "need for vehicle use" attainable?



Priority 8: Preserve and uphold the high quality of architecture and the unique visual aesthetic form in buildings and neighborhoods that distinguish Palm Springs from other cities.

- 83% of respondents voted to keep as is
- Suggested Changes:
 - Clarify "high quality architecture"
 - Flexibility for low- or moderate-income housing and housing for people experiencing homelessness
 - Add "respect our historic heritage"
 - Approved buildings should not exceed historical height limits
 - Address construction delays
 - Consider further diversity in style
 - Maintain views and natural setting






- 72% of respondents voted to keep as is
- Suggested Changes:
 - More emphasis on mass transit
 - Add reference to safety
 - Reference parking
 - Mixed feedback on presence of bike lanes
 - Enhance sidewalk lighting Improve road condition
 - Address issues with traffic light timing



Priority 10: Promote development that enhances scenic views and provides both visual and physical access to the City's surrounding mountains, washes, open space, and other scenic and natural resources.


- 78% of respondents voted to keep as is
- Suggested Changes:
 - Does this conflict with other priorities relating to development and growth?
 - Exchanging the word "promote" with "support"
 - Replace "wash" with "ephemeral stream"
 - Change "enhances" to "enhances and protects"
